Preliminary estimates reveal that as on 1st August, 2002 there was an approximate backlog of 25% in terms of area sown in all states put together.

States have drawn up their contingent plans for alternate crops and re-sowing and supply of Drinking Water and Fodder etc. Central Government Departments have geared up to offer supplementary assistance. Agriculture Minister has taken a Conference of Agriculture and Relief Ministers of the affected States. Both Central and State Governments are in a state of preparedness to deal with the situation.

Wells in Gir Forests

Will the Minister of ENVIRONMENT AND FORESTS be pleased to state:

(a) whether it is a fact that more than 12,000 wells in Gir Forests have turned to be death trap for lions and are endangering the lives of lions and other wild animals; and

(b) if so, the action taken to cover those wells?

THE MINISTER OF ENVIRONMENT AND FORESTS (SHRI T.R. BAALU) : (a) and (b) Wells are dug by villagers in and around Gir Protected area to overcome the shortage of water during lean months. Most of these wells do not have parapet walls and as a result occasionally there have been reports of wild animals falling into such wells. Forest Department has constructed parapet walls around 505 open wells during the period from April, 1999 to July, 2002 to prevent such accidents.
