

National Literacy Mission

298. SHRI SURESH PACHOURI : Will the Minister of HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT be pleased to state:

(a) whether the National Literacy Mission was set up with the target of making 100 million persons in the age group of 15-35 years literate, in a phased manner; and

(b) if so, the progress made under the schemes, State-wise since its inception?

THE MINISTER OF HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT (DR. MURLI MANOHAR JOSHI): (a) National Literacy Mission was set up in May, 1988 with an aim of imparting functional literacy to 80 million adult illiterates in 15-35 age group by 1995. This was further extended to 100 million by the end of Eighth Five Year Plan. The goal has now been defined to attain full literacy i.e. a sustainable threshold level of 75 per cent literacy by 2005.

(b) A Statement is annexed (See below). According to National Family Health survey-2, released in November, 2000, the literacy rate in 1998 was 66.9 per cent in 15-39 age group.
