OF CULTURE (KUMARI SELJA): (a) and (b) Government have taken a decision to expand the scheme during the 8th plan so as to provide 3 rooms and 3 teachers in about 30' per cent primary schools where enrolment exceeds 100 and to Primary Schools and the schemes would be launched from 1994-95 and 1995-96 respectively when all the schools in the Country including Saurashtra region would be taken up for coverage in a phased manner. The schemes, however, could be launched earlier and coverage enhanced depending on the availability of funds.

Central assistance will consist of salary of additional teacher during the VIIIth plan and for equipment for upper primary schools. Construction will be the State Governments responsibility.
