CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION WITH ADDITIONAL CHARGE OF THE MINISTER OF STATE THE IN MINISTRY OF COMMERCE (SHRI KAMALUDDIN AHMED): (a) to (c) The EOU Scheme aims to provide an internationally competitive, duty free environment for export production at low cost. Entrepreneure can seek assistance of Commodity Councils, Boards etc. and Indian abroad in ascertaining market opportunities for items proposed to be manufactured under the EOU Scheme. A number of modifications have been affected in the Scheme since 1991 with a view to improve the climate for Export Oriented Units.

Impact of changes in Exim policy

- 698. SHRI F. UPENDRA: Will the Minister of COMMERCE be pleased to state:
- (a) whether the recent changes in exim policy have not benefited the small exporters and the small-scale industries; and

THE MINISTER OF COMMERCE (SHRI PRANAB MUKHERJEE) : and (b) For the purpose of recognition as Export House, Trading House Star Trading House, double weightage is given to physical export of products manufactured by Small Scale Industries (SST), handicrafts handloom and including sports goods, hand-knotted carpets silk products. Further, under Duty Exemption Scheme, SSI unit exporting its own manufactured products, is required execute a legal undertaking OF bank guarantee equivalent to half of the normal amount of BG|LUT.

Export of Chemicals and Pharmaceuticals

- 699. SHRI KAMAL MORARKA: Will the Minister of COMMERCE be pleased to state:
- (a) whether it is a fact that the export of basic chemicals and pharmaceuticals to Rupee Currency Area has virtually come to a halt during the first half of the current year;
- (b) if so, what are the reasons therefor,
- (c) what were the exports achieved during the corresponding period last year to the RCA; and
- (d) what were the exports made to General Currency Area during the last year and the current year ?

THE MINISTER OF COMMERCE (SHRI PRANAB MUKHERJEE): (a) No, Sir. The total exports of the Basic Chemicals and Pharmaceuticals including Fine Chemicals during April-Septemer, 1991 was Rs. 638.48 crores, out of which Rs. 146.65 crores was to RCA countries whereas in April-September, 1992 the total exports was Rs. 708.13 crores, out of which Rs. 34.24 crores was to RCA countries. This itself reflects that the exports to RCA countries have substantially come down but not to a halt.
