THE MINISTER OF STATE OF THE MINISTRY OF LABOUR (SHRI P. A. SANGMA): (a) to (d) The Scheme of Employees' Participation in Management, notified in 1983, has been reviewed from time to time by a Tripartite Committee set up to monitor the implementation of the Scheme. The Scheme has been discussed in National and Regional Seminars as also in the State Labour Ministers' Conference and the Indian Labour Conference during 1990.

The Scheme has been implemented in 106 out of 235 Central Public Sector Enterprises. Another 62 Public Sector undertakings have implemented their own schemes.

Even though the scheme has led to a better understanding between the management and the workers, its implementanot been entirely successful. tion has opinions expressed in Based on the forums, the Participation of Workers in Management Bill, 1990 was, therefore, introduced in Rajya Sabha on 30th May, 1990. The Bill has not yet been taken up for consideration as yet as a large number of notices for making amendments in the Bill were received. These are being examined.

Strength of Labour Officers

3882. SHRI MOHINDAR SINGH KALYAN :

Will the Minister of LABOUR be pleased to state:

- (a) what is the total number of Labour Officers under Central Government as on 1st March, 1993;
- (b) what is the total amount being spent on their salaries, wages and other emoluments;
- (c) whether due to the new economic policy some of the officers would become redundant; and
- (d) whether fresh recruitment of labour officer has been stopped in the matter?

THE MINISTER OF STATE OF THE MINISTRY OF LABOUR (SHRI P. A. SANGMA): (a) As on 1st March, 1993, 115 Labour Officers and 60 Senior Labour Officers were in position in various establishments and organisations under the Central Government.

- (b) The expenditure on pay and allowances of Labour Officers/Senior Labour Officers are met from the Budget provisions of the user organisations and as such no account of this expenditure is being maintained centrally.

- (d) if so, what are the details thereof;
- (e) whether the Institution alongwith is courses is fully recognised by Government;
- (f) if so, what are the details thereof and if not, the reasons for allowing such Institutions to function;
- (g) whether similar recognised Institutions are functioning in the country; and
- (h) if so, details thereof and if not, reasons therefor?
