Reduction of size of LIG and MIG Flats

7256 SHRI O. P. KOHLI: Will the Minister of URBAN DEVELOPMENT be pleased to state:

- (a) the reasons as to why the DDA had reduced the sizes of L.I.G. and M.I.G. flats (NPRS, 1979) at Bindapur at the time of allotment in 1993; and
- (b) the reasons why the price of certain flats were increased by as much as 26 times in violation of the High Court order in which the DDA was asked not to increase the original amount more than 4/5 times?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF URBAN DEVELOPMENT (SHRI P. K. THUN. GON): (a) The Delhi Development Authority has reported that, due to the rise in cost of construction, it has decided to allot partially-built in. cremental flats of reduced plinth area with the provision for the allottee to build additional floors himself, when fully built, the size of these fats will be more than the minimum prescribed size of LIGIM1G flats, with the added advantage that allottees pay only for the portion built by the

DDA. In addition, incremental houses given an advantage to the allottee to have his own fully-owned house an compared to flatted construction and to increase living space on a need basis.

(b) The DDA has denied that the costs of the flats has increased by 20 times. The prices of flats are worked out by them on completion of flats from time to time on 'actual cost' basis. The High Court order regarding prices of certain flats has been referred to a larger Bench by the Hon'ble Supreme Court for consideration,

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE THE MINISTRY OF URBAN DEVE-LOPMENT (SHRI P. K. 'THUN-GON): (a) and (b) There existig wide inter and inter-regiona.4 varia-tiong in the degree of urbanisation among various States as can be sw»n from the enclosed Anne-sure (See Appendix 170, Annexure No. 145), The reasons for wide regional variations are: -

- (i) Wide di€er«ne_e in rural-urban papulation base. rates of birth and death and rural urban and ur-ban urban miiration in States . due to historical socio-economic and demographic factors.
- (ii) Wide defference in economic development (agricultural and industrial develoment) patterns leading to interregional ineeme/ wage differentials due to natural and other faets including patterns of private investment, etc. These differences substantially affect natural growth and migration patterns.
- (c) Government of India does have any specific preferential policy far the States having the urbanisation index below the national average.
