THE MANIPUR APPROPRIATION (No. 2) BILL,, 1994.

THE DEPUTY CHAIRMAN; Now_j we will take up the Manipur Appropriation (No. 2) BUI, 1994. Mr, Chandrashekhar Murthy.

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF FINANCE (SHRI M. V. CHANDRASHEKHAR MURTHY): Madam, I beg to move;

"That the Bill to authorise payment and appropriation of certain sums from and out of the Consolidated Fund of the State of Manipur for the services of the financial year 1994-95, as passed by the Lok Sabha, be taken into consideration."

Madam, as the hon. Members are aware, the Budget of the State of Manipur for 1994-95, was presented to Parliament on the 7th March, 1994 and a 'Vote of Account' to meet the requirements of the State Government for the first six months ending September, 1994 was obtained and the Appropriation (Vote-on-Account) Act 1994 wag passed in March, 1994.

THE DEPUTY CHAIRMAN: Mr. Minister, please speak into the mike, You are not audible enough.

SHRI M, V. CHANDRASHEKHAR MURTHY: Right, Madam. The Lok Sabha has granted the balance of the D>emands for Giants and has passed the connected Appropriation Bill, which is now before this House. To meet the total estimated expenditure during the current year, the Bill piovids for the payment and appropriation from and out of the Consolidated Fund of Manipur a total sum of Rs. 629.99 crores, comprising Rs. 550.47 crores voted by the Lok Sabha and Rs. 79.52 crores charged on the Consolidated Fund of rhe State, and is inclusive of the sum earlier authorised for withdrawal under the Manipur Appropriation (Vote-on-Aceount) Act 1994.

Madam, i_n March, 1994, while discussing the Appropriation (Vote-on-A'ccount) Bill, this House had a general discussion on the Manipur Budget for 1994-95. I do not, therefore, wish to take the time of the House by again dwelling on the various pro. visions in the Budget. I shall, however, endeavour to deal with the points that may be raised by the hon. Members, in my reply to the discussion. I commend the Bill for the consideration of the House.

The question was pro-posed,

SHRI BHUBANESWAR KALITA (Assam); Thank you, Madam, for giving me this opportunity to initi-a+3 this discussion in this House. We have once again come to this House to pass the Appropriate Bil because we have no Assembly in Manipur. Madam, the background in which the Central Government had to impose President's Rule in Manipur is known to all of us and the circumstances in which we have to pass this Appropriation Bill for a meagre sum are also known to us. This money will be spent on establishment and in some other! non-developmental sector. This wiH not be spent in the developmental sector. But, anyway, Madam, when the Bill has come before the House, we have to discuss

it and we .have to give our own sug gestions so that the Government can lake some of our suggestions into consideration and take steps to im prove the conditions in that economaealiy backward State or the North- Easren region. The present situa- tion in Manipur is not very encou raging. Although we thought that ine situation would improve after me promulgation .of President's Rule and we have seen some improvement an the "beginning of the year also la the firs I few moaths of this vear there was a genuine improvement and we thought that this would con tinue and we would once again see that the State moved on the path of progress and development and p ;ace and prosperity came to Mani pur. But there were some disturb ing news in the last few weeks when vw had seen that the ethnic flashes like Naga-kuki clashes taking place. I do not know why these clashes h;A Lsuddenly started again when the matter was bout to be settled politically. There are broad reasons for this, which I want to discuss in this House. But I hope that if we take some concrete measures, some concrete steps, the situation will de finitely improve. It is not difficult to handle it because the insurgency that has started in Manipur and some of the ethnic clashes which took place in Manipur are not some thing exclusive that has happened, but it has become a phenomenon, in that part of the country, which ne eds national attention and needs to be handled by the Central Gover-ment as a national roblem. Madam, the deterioration really started when the present Assembly, which ie now under suspended animation, elected. This Assemly was constituted as a hung Assembly and the then Government waa formed in such a dicumstance, when there was no majority of any party although the Conrgeess Party was the single largest party. Madam, fortunately or Unfortunately, I was a witness to how this Manipur Assembly was elected

and how the claim ot' the single largest party was denied or ignored.

Madam today, in this House I pay lay respectiul tributes to Raj KumarJ'aichandiajj the former Chief Minister of Manipur. Actually, in his two yours' Chief Ministership, he brought some improvement in the law and order situation cleated by insurgency. I pay my tributes to him because I know now sincere fie was how dedi cated i-, was. He was a Member of this House. He was- aiso in the Union Governnieiif for some time. He was a person during whole rule a serious thought was given to the insurgency pi obi em nd he really tried to solve the basic problem Irom where the -Whole deterioration had started. Madam, lie is no more with us today. I am mentioning his name to pay my tributes to him because a a lot ii. i'. Ta= he who contributed finding a solution to the insur gency problem and the law and order probem in Manipur. After Jaichandra Singh and aifter the Assembly elections, a hung Assembly was constituted and a regional party-Govern ment was formed and the whole de terioration had started resulting in the dissolution of the regional par iy Ministry the it Com- plaints had started coming that 1he politicians were giving succour to the insurgents. There were complaints against some Ministers. That Ministry fell in ita own way and a Congress Ministry came inot power and some improvement took place. However, if, was too premature to expect any significant progress, any significant improvement, because the time was too short and the problem was too serious, Today we have Central rule in Manipur. I am happy to say that the Central Government has taken some concrete measures to find out the real reasons for the insurgency in the backwardness of these States. The Government has rightly constituted three high powered Committees to look into all the problems of Manipur and of the other States of the North-Eastern region

Though their findings have not come out I have seen in the newspapers that the Committees have told the [ress thai the main reason, the basis cause for insurgency, restlessness[^] militancy and extremism is the economic problem or the economic backwardness of the area. This is what has been told to the Press by these three Committees. They were headed by senior Central Ministers. One was headed by the Laeder of the House, Shri S.B. Chavan, the second wi-; headed by Dr. Manmohan Singh .slid the third was headed by Shri Pranab Mukherjee, These Committeeg nave rightly told the Press the basic reasons for the disturbing situation, insurgency, restlessness, militancy and extremism in the North-Eastern Scales, particularly in Manipur. I im happy that they have realised this and they have gone into te real reasons for these problems.

V>'hen I talk about the economie •backwardness, which is the basic reason for all these problems. I would'* ?ay that people of Manipur are not industrious they are not as nationalistic .as we are. The people of Manipur had fought against the Britishers. They had been felled down. They had never surrendtred. That is their race. That is the background of the people in this border area of the country Unfortunately, no back-up is given to these industries people. We don't have any economic programmes to give them encouragement, to offer them » proper livelihood. There is no major industry. There is not even a major to mention about. The only agricultural economy is very poor. Though there are agriculture in the vallye, it doesn't contribute much to the State exchequer, to the expenditure for development and prosperity of the State. So also is the tourism industry which could Have been developed in a big. A large number of foreign tourists, Japanest, British, etc., ewe there. They come there to pay tribute to their people who died there. Madam-today, all over the world, one can

see those areas in the films made by Hollywood and by the other film-makers of America and the UK. But, unfortunately to develop those areas and to take tourists, tihtre. we don't have the proper back-up and we do not have proper development ctf Communication there Until and unless the ourism, industry is developed, the revenue of the State exchequer wiU remain meagre and it wiU depend more on the Central assistance,

It is very unfortunate to say that the people of that part of the country have not yet received the benefit of a railway line. If they want to travel by rail they have to come all the way to Guwa-hati to board a train-Madam, after so many years of Independence, after so many years of planned development, we are yet to take a railway line to Manipur. All these factors resulted in unemployment of the young people. I realy admire the spirit of the foung people of Manipur.We all konw how much industrious they are. Manipur got 13 Gold Medals in the last National Games in Pune. Everywhere, in every sport, in every cultutural activity and in every field you will see , Manipuri. But unforunately we have failed to give them employment and we have failed to develop them economically. As a result of unemployment, the young people have become insurgents. They have joined other fields which are not respectable for this country. Now, I come to smuggling. Why is it increasing day by day? Who are these smugglers? They are the unemployed people. Then there is drug-trafficking Drugtrafficking1 and smuggling are the results of unemployment. We have not been able to give them employment That is why they are doine any+hing to earn their livelihood Madam, this has resulted in serious diseases like AIDS. Now, due to drug-trafficlring AIDS has spread to Manipur and from Manipur it is going to other parts of the country, If

we don't give a serious thought to it and if it continues, then how can we expect this are to develop? We have to give a serious thought io this problem. Until and unless the unemployment problem is solved, until and unless they are given employment, until and unless we increase the economic activities in the Statt, the problem wiH remain there nad the frustration of the people wiU increase. It has keen rightly said, it ha^ been rightly demanded by my colleagues that the Sixth Shedule shiji.itd be extended. Our hon. Prime Minister once said

"The Sixth Schedul? is a verv Conprittional instrument good for and economic development North-East." I support I agree that the upliftment of the tribal people can te dun-3 by extextension of the Sixth Schedule to those triba Madam, the tribal people living in the hills of Manipur, and the Mus lims and other tribals living in the valleys and until a few years they were living in a state of harmony-How has that harmony been bed now? This distur harmony wag living hed when the people there did not seo any future in that State ei th/er lor tltemselveg or for their children. And, one group started fighting with the other. That is how the Naga-Kuki clashes, the communal clashes, came about. Madam, if we have to really tackle the problem of insurgency in Manipur or anywhere else in the North-Eastern region, we have to take it as a national problem and we have to take some concrete measures so that they will feel that they are being treated like other Indians belonging to any other part of India. The Central Governmenti has rightly appointed three Committees to go into the basic cause_s of this prefo-lem. If the Reports of these three. Committees are accepted, I believe that a comprehensive eononi'c policy for the Nonh-Eostem Region, including Manipur, can be brought

A special programme should be ubout undertaken to uplift th& people of this legion. The special treatment should not only be in words, As we Know, Manipur is already g. special-category State. But, what is "special category" in the real sense? What is the speciality about it? Allotting a little more funds is the speciality? If we really want to give special-category status to that State if we rtally want speciality ^ in them, we have to give special attention. Special measures should be taken to see do it that that part of the country develops in big way. Madamwe have seen the Appropriation Bill. How is the money spent? About fifty five per cent of the total Budget allotted to Manipur goed towards establishment, which does not contribute anything to development as such, then about 25 per cent is for the valleys and 20 per cent is for the hills. A major chunk of it goes for the maintenance of law and order, within does not, in any way, contribute to the development of the economy of that State. There is vicious circle in the sense thiat there is insurgency because there is no development, and there is no development because there is insurgency. And, because of insurgency, the people do not want to put up industries there; the people do not want to start industries there. So, we get into that vicious circle which never ends. I would like to suggest that some economic programmes should be undertaken by the Government-The Government should pay special attention to the lopment of that State economically. Small-scale industries and agro-based industries should be set up there. Tourism also should be promoeed. It should also take con. crete measures to bring railway services to Manipur the Railway Ministry. Madam, there is a demand for setting up a Central University. This aspect also should be looked into, because in each of the other North-Eastern States namely, Meghalaya, Nagaland and Mizoram,

a Central University is there. I don't know why Manipur should toe left out. The demand lor setting up of a Central University should also be considered by the concerned Ministry. I request the Government not to come before this House with another Appropriation Bill again after six months and the Government should see to it that the Central rule is ended in Manipur and a popular Government established. I appeal to the Central Government to restore the popular Government in Manipur and revive the Manipur Assembly.

Thank you very much, Madam.
