Competition faced by Indian construction companies abroad

SHRIMATI KAMLA SINHA:

Will the Minister of COMMERCE be pleased to state:

(a) whether it is a fact that Indian Construction Companies are being

hampered to compete in global construction business and the construction export due to redtapism at Government level;

(b) whether the Indian Construction Companies have made any representation thereon to Government; and

(c) what steps are being taken by Government to eliminate the redtapism in the approval of construction project abroad and liberalise procedures to make Indian Construction exports competitive?

(a) and (b) No, Sir.

(c) In order to provide single window clearance to project exporters from India, a working Group comprising representatives from Reserve Bank of India, Export Credit and Guarantee Corporation, EXIM Bank, sponsoring Banks, Ministry of Commerce, Department of Economic Affairs under the auspices of EXIM Bank of India considers for approval, project export bids involving deferred payment and or issue of guarantees where value of export bid exceeds Rs. 20 crores. The above mechanism has been evolved specially with a view to avoid delay in clearing the proposals.
