the Annapooma Scheme, to indigent old persons even in the case of those receiving old age pension from the State Governments; (vi) Foodgrains at CEP applicable for BPL families will be allocated for welfare schemes implemented by the various Ministries of the Government of India;

- (vii) Foodgrains will be allocated for development schemes (where the beneficiaries belong to BPL category), implemented by NGOs sponsored by the State Governments and endorsed by the administrative Ministry in the Government of India, as also by International Organisation like the World Food Programme:
- (viii) Government have also launched Antyodaya Anna Yqjana on 25-12-2000. Under this scheme, Government will release wheat and rice @ Rs. 21- and Rs. 3/- per kg. respectively subject to 25 kg. per family per month to approximately one crore poorest of the poor families all over the country, and the State Governments have accordingly been requested to identify these families.
 - (ix) Certain measures have been taken by the Food Corporation of India to reduce costs, *viz.*, reduction in incurrence of shortage, demurrages, better utilisation of storage space etc.

FOOD AND PUBLIC DISTRIBUTION (SHRI ASHOK PRADH AN): (a) The Food Corporation of India has a total of 2275 godowns (Owned & Hired/Covered and CAP) with a total storage capacity of 35.45 million tonnes as on 1-10-2001. Slatewise details are given in Statement (*See below*).

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(b) The quantity of foodgrains stored in these warehouses as on 1 st October. 2001 was 31.07 Million Tonnes and their respective figures in the three preceding years were as under :—

(d) The stocks of foodgrains with FCI are preserved on scientific lines to prevent damage. The following steps are also taken to preserve foodgrains :— (i) Foodgrains are stored in rodent and damp proof godowns. (ii) Pest control measures are undertaken regularly, (iii) Qualified and technically traind staff is deployed for periodical

inspection and proper upkeep of foodgrains. (iv) To avoid damage in transit, the foodgrains are moved in covered wagons, as far as possible. When moved in open wagons, the same are covered with tarpauline etc. (v) They are subjected to prophylactic and curative treatments also, (vi) In CAP storage, the stocks are stored in wooden crates and covered with low density black polythene cover (LDPE), which are water proof. These are tied with nylon ropes to prevent damage by ballooning of covers during high velocity winds.
