

Right to Work as Fundamental Right

743. DR. RATNAKAR PANDEY: Will the PRIME MINISTER be pleased to state:

(a) whether the Government have abandoned the proposal to include the right to work as a fundamental right in the Constitution; and

(b) if so, the reasons therefor?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF LABOUR AND THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF WELFARE (SHRI RAMJILAL SUMAN): (a) and (b) Government is seized of the issue in the context of generating more employment opportunities for all concerned.

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE PRIME MINISTER'S OFFICE (SHRI KAMAL MORARKA): Eighth Five Year Plan is in the process of finalisation. The exercises relating to the outlay for the Eighth Five Year Plan are underway.

Within the framework of Approach to the Eighth Five Year Plan, as approved ' by the National Development Council, some" of the priorities are employment generation, poverty alleviation, rural development, improvement of land and environment literacy and education with special emphasis on female education.
