Increase in procurement prices of foodgrains

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICUL TURE AND COOPERATION IN THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE (SHRI JAYANTILAL VIRCHAND-BHAI SHAH); (a) The procurement/ minimum support prices of foodgrains have been revised by the Government every crop season since 1985-86. The procurement/minimum support prices announced for the 1989-90 kharif and rabi crops were revised in October, 1989 and April 1990 respectively Details are given in the statement annexed (See below)

(b) The procurement/minimum support prices are revised every season after considering the recommendations of the Commission for Agricultural Costs and Prices (CACP) In recommending the price policy, the CACP takes into account a number of factors including changes in cost of production, input prices, demand and supply, inter-crop price parity, effect on cost of living, parity between prices paid and prices received, etc

The procurement/minimum support prices for kharif crops of 1989-90 were revised to compensate the farmers for the increase in the prices of inputs and general price rise between the commencement of the sowing season and the arrival of crops in the The procurement/minimum support prices of rabi crops of 1989-90 were revised after the Government decided to adopt the revised methodology for estimation of cost of production of crops, which is one of the factors considered by the CACP in formulating price policy for agricultural commodities
