

industrial activities including thermal power plants. The Maharashtra pollution Control Board has monitored carbon monoxide levels at traffic junctions in Bombay. It is observed that the carbon monoxide levels at the traffic junctions were found in the range of 8.2 to 20.8 ppm. These higher levels are due to heavy traffic of automobiles. However, the ambient air quality levels of carbon monoxide in the residential areas are well within the limits. However, from smoking, the carbon monoxide exposure is of several orders of magnitude over the levels that have been found at various traffic junctions in Bombay.

Protection against terrorist activities in coastal areas of Ramanathapuram and Tanjore

*13. SHRI S.K.T. RAMACHANDRAN: Will the PRIME MINISTER be pleased to state:

(a) what effective steps are being taken by the defence forces of India to save innocent Indians, living in the coastal areas of Ramanathapuram and Tanjore districts of Tamil Nadu, from the terrorist activities of extremists from a neighbouring country, in view of the recent abduction of customs officials who were later released after cruel treatment; and

(b) whether Government have stationed military forces in this vulnerable area to protect innocent citizens, in view of the need for round the clock vigil in this area; if not, what steps have been taken in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF DEFENCE (DR. RAJA RAMANNA): (a) Appropriate measures have been taken by the State Government to ensure the safety and security of the population living in the coastal districts of Tamil Nadu. A coordination Committee of the concerned State and Central agencies has been set up at the State level for effective and coordinated action. District officials of the affected coastal districts have also been directed to liaise with the Central agencies for coordinated action.

(b) Joint patrols by Indian Naval, Indian Coast Guard and Sri Lankan Naval Ships and aircraft are being carried out along the line of control. Army troops have not been deployed on internal security duties in the coastal areas of Tamil Nadu as the situation does not warrant it.
