

review of on-going projects in DRDOj is a continuous activity. A comprehensive review of projects was carried out in mid 1989 to close down projects where objectives have been achieved and also to identify projects for closure where objectives have been significantly achieved but further continuance of activities would not result into incremental cost-effective gains. The closure of such R&D projects would result in considerable saving of funds for reallocation to priority projects in the principal thrust areas. It will not be in public interest to disclose the details regarding the classified projects reviewed for closure.

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF DEFENCE (DR. RAJA RAMANNA): (a) The Seventh Five Year Plan for Defence was approved in August, 1988.

(b) Formal approval of the Seventh Five Year Plan for Defence involved consideration of complex issues, re-assessment of the threat scenario, allocating resources including foreign exchange to the Services, Defence Research & Development and for Defence Production Units.- These considerations took more time than assessed earlier.
