SPECIAL MENTIONS

Need to give Royalty to Maharashtra Government on Oil and Natural Gas extracted from Bombay High

SHRI VISHWASRAO RAMRAO PATIL (Maharashtra): Madam Deputy Chairman, I want to raise a very important issue which is about royalty on oil and natural gas extracted from the Bombay High. The Oil and Natural Gas Commission extracts oil and natural gas from the off-shore wells of the Bombay High. Considering the proximity of the coast of Maharashtra to these oil wells and the large income that is derived by the Central Government from these natural resources the State Government examined the feasibility of claiming a royalty for the State of Maharashtra on the oil and natural was extracted from the Bombay High.

The Constitution declares India as a Union of States and demarcates the territory of each State as provided in the first Schedule of the Constitution. The continental shelf as defined in section 6(1) of the Maritime Zones Act (80 of 1976) is the natural prolongation of the land territory to the outer edge of the "continental margin" in the sea. Thus, Bombay High which produces oil and natural gas is a natural prolongation of Maharashtra. Under the express provisions of the Constitution and under the law enacted by Parliament under article 297(3), the Union Government has assumed full and exclusive control over the lands, minerals and other things of value which are within the territorial waters over the continental
