

### Rejection of revised pay scales by Delhi School teachers

\*218. DR. BAPU KALDATE: Will the Minister of HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT be pleased to state:

(a) whether it is a fact that the new pay-scales awarded recently to the primary, middle and secondary school teachers, have been rejected by Delhi school teachers;

(b) if so, whether Government have considered the memorandum submitted by the teachers' organisations for the modification of the pay-scales; and

(c) if not, what are the reasons therefor?

THE MINISTER OF HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT (SHRI P. SHIV SHANKER): (a) and (b) Pursuant to the recommendations of the IV Central Pay Commission, the Government revised the pay-scales for school teachers on 12.8.87 keeping in view the report of the National Commission on Teachers-I and provisions of the new Education Policy. While various Teachers' organisations have been representing for modifications in the pay-scales, they have not conveyed rejection of these to the Government.

### Strategy for earning from tourism

Will the Minister of CIVIL AVIATION AND TOURISM be pleased to state:

(a) whether Government have chalked out any strategy for tourism to receive three million tourists by 1990 and to earn Rs. 5,000 crores in foreign exchange; and

(b) if so, what are the details thereof?

THE MINISTER OF HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE (SHRI MOTI LAL VORA): (a) and (b) The National Committee on Tourism set up by the Planning Commission for the formulation of a long term perspective Plan for tourism sector has projected that India can receive 3 million tourists and earn Rs. 5,000 crores in foreign exchange by the turn of the century. The Committee has made several recommendations in this regard. These, *inter-alia* include-(i) a package of financial incentives for motivating private sector investment in tourism related activities, (ii) re-organisation of the Department of Tourism, India Tourism Development Corporation and the training institutes under the Department of Tourism, and (iii) a strategy for rapid augmentation of air and ground transport capacity.

### Connivance of RPF Personnel in Wagon breaking

(a) whether Government are aware of the unabated menace of wagon breaking due to the overt and covert support of the Railway Protection Force;

(b) whether Government take immediate action on the receipt of such information;

(c) if so, what is the number of RPF personnel found to have connived in such matters, the number of those suspended/discharged from service during the last three years; and

(d) whether there has been any improvement in this regard?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI MAHABIR PRASAD): (a) There have been a few such cases.
