THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF WELFARE (SHRI GIRI-DHAR GOMANGO): (a) and (b) Under the National Policy on Education, 1986, it is envisaged to prepare primer. s for Classes I & II in tribal languages having more than 1 -lakh speakers by the end of Seventh Five Year Plan. The new educational policy also, inter-alia, underlines the need to develop the curricula and devise instructional materials in tribal languages at the initial stages with arrangements for switching over to the regional languages. The Central Institute of Indian Languages, Mysore, has taken up 51 tribal languages for linguistic description and material production.
