all relevant issues and also to work out a comprehensive Resettlement and Rehabilitation Policy ensuring livelihood from the project to at least one person from each displaced family.

#### Trade with Myanmar

3673. DR. ABHISHEK MANU SINGHVI: Will the Minister of COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY be pleased to state:

- (a) the quantum of trade between India and Myanmar during the last three years, commodity-wise and money-wise; and
- (b) whether the Myanmar our second largest neighbour, there is great scope for mutual trade and commerce relation; if so, what steps Government propose to adopt, especially in view of cordial visit of our Minister of External Affairs in January, 2007 to have more meaningful and purposeful export and import thrust with Myanmar?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE, MINISTRY OF COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY (SHRI JAIRAM RAMESH): (a) Desired information is given in the Statement (See below).

(b) There is great scope for mutual trade and commerce relations with Myanmar, a very important neighbour for India. The External Affairs Minister paid an official visit to Myanmar from 19-21 January 2007. During his meetings with the Myanmar leadership, the full range of bilateral relations was discussed including measures to enhance trade between India and Myanmar. The policy matters in respect of increasing bilateral trade between India and Myanmar were discussed in detail in Second Joint Trade Committee (JTC) meeting held in May 2006 where the JTC mandated both governments to initiate necessary action for the opening of the third border post at Pangsau Pass and also to include additional products in the trade basket.
