DR. MOHD. HASHIM KIDWAI :  
Has there been any increase or decrease in the production of paper?

MR. CHAIRMAN: The figures are there.

SHRI VASANT SATHE; I have given the figures.

SHRI V. NARAYANASAMY: Mr. Chairman, Sir, I have gone through the statement submitted before the House by the hon. Minister. There are 252 private and public sector paper units in the country. In spite of that we are not in a stable manner. What steps has in a position to keep the price of paper the Government taken to keep the price line of paper stable and reasonable?

SHRI VASANT SATHE; Sir, the best thing to keep any price under control is to produce more and that is why we fasrve

licensed so much capacity. The total capacity that is installed in large and small units is 23,49,590 tonnes. The demand varie, round about 11 to 12 lakh tonnes and there has been an increase, actually, in 1983 from 1.1.98, that is, approximately 12 lakh tonnes to i, adequate production of this article, and 13.71 lakh tonnes. Therefore, there price is normally determined by the demand and supply position.

SHRI VISHWA BANDHU GUPTA: Sir, would the Minister kindly let m know whether the price of paper in the world has also risen or it is specially in India that the prices are going up?

SHRI VASANT SATHE: Sir, I am not aware of the world price. I will need notice for this. If my hon. friend wants to know, I will try to get the information and give it to him.
