

Plan proposals prepared by the Ministry of Education are in keeping with the target of achievement of universalisation of elementary education by 1990. It is estimated that by the end of 1984-85 out of approximately 1400 lakh children in the age-group 6-14; 1160 lakhs would be enrolled. By the end of Seventh Plan i.e. 1989-90, it is estimated that 1800 lakh children will have to be enrolled to achieve universalisation of elementary education. Accordingly an estimated 640 lakh additional children will have to be enrolled by 1990. It is proposed to cover 250 lakhs through formal schools and 390 lakhs through non-formal system. Since enrolment of girls is lagging behind, special emphasis is being laid on enrolment of girls for which two specific schemes, are in operation in nine educationally backward States, viz. Andhra Pradesh, Assam, Bihar, Jammu and Kashmir, Madhya Pradesh, Orissa, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal. These schemes are (1) Centrally sponsored scheme of non-formal education centres exclusively for girls on 90:10 sharing basis; and (2) Centrally sponsored scheme of appointment of women teachers in primary schools on 80:20 sharing basis. In addition to these a scheme of incentive/awards for excellence of performance in enrolment of girls at the elementary level to all States/UTs at the Panchayat/CD Block/TD Block/district/State levels is in operation since 1983-84.

Apart from the above States have been advised to extend the coverage of other incentive schemes being operated by them for girls and other weaker sections of society such as SC/ST.
