Enforcing Labour Laws in the Brick Kiln Industry

Will the Minister of LABOUR AND REHABILITATION be pleased to state:

(a) whether Government are aware of the fact that the brick-kiln workers particularly in the northern region are forced to work over 14 hours a day without covered sheds or workshops; and

(b) what are the reasons for delay in the implementation of labour laws relating to workers in brick-kiln, particularly in the northern region where large number of workers are employed on contract basis for eight months in the year?

THE MINISTER OF LABOUR AND REHABULT ATION (SHRI VEEREN-DRA PATIL): (a) Reports have been received in regard to unsatisfactory working conditions of workers in the brick-bilm industry in the country.

(b) There is no reported delay in the implementation by State Governments of labour laws applicable to the brick kiln industry.

(c) the financial and other losses to each industry, exchequer and the workers;

(d) the number of workers rendered unemployed in each case;

(e) how many of these strikes and lockouts resulted in violence including loss of life and property; and

(f) what steps have been taken by Government to minimise the same?

THE MINISTER OF LABOUR AND REHABILITATION (SHRI VEEREN-DRA PATIL): (a) and (b) Statement-I giving information for the period from 1.1.1983 to 31.3.84 is laid on the Table of the House. Strikes and lockouts have generally been over issues relating to wages and allowances, bonus, personnel and retrenchment, indiscipline and violence.

(c) Statement-II is laid on the Table of the House. Revenue loss to Government due to industrial disputes is not maintained.

(d) the information is given in Statement I laid on the Table of the House.

(e) Information on strikes and lockouts resulting in violence is not maintained.

(f) Government are keeping a constant watch on the industrial relations situation in the country. The Industrial Relations Machinery both at the Centre and in the States continue to make efforts to reduce workstoppages through preventive mediation. conciliation. adjudication and arbitration.
