THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI KHURSHID ALAM KHAN): (a) According to latest available information from the high Commission of India in Hong Kong, there were approximately 20,000 people of Indian origin in Hong Kong as on 31 December, 1983.

(b) Of the above number, approximately 4,400 persons of Indian origin had acquired British Dependent Territories Citizenship and 14,746 persons were Indian citizens.

**Famine in African Countries**

(a) whether Government are aware that several African countries such as Ethiopia, Sudan, Somalia, Kenya and Tanzania have been stricken by severe drought and famine;

(b) whether the Government of India have offered to supply, as gift, foodgrains to these countries; and

(c) if so, what are the details in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI KHURSHID ALAM KHAN): (a) Yes, Sir.

(b) and (c) The Government of India is gifting 100,000 tonnes of wheat through the World Food Programme/International Emergency Food Reserve to needy African countries. Under this arrangement India will pay the costs for the grain, internal transport and handling to the nearest Indian ports, and the WFP/IEFR will meet the ocean freight and handling costs at the receiving end. Shipments commenced in February 1985, and are expected to be completed by April 1985. At
