SHRI V. GOPALSAMY (Tamil Nadu). Mr. Vice-Chairman, Sir, I am very glad for the opportunity I got this day to make a special mention about the great patriotic poet, Subramanya Bharati. The year-long celebrations of the birth centenary of Subramanya Bharati, the great patriotic poet, begin today. He was born on September, 11, 1881 in Tamil Nadu. He was a versatile genius in many languages. He was a versatile poet. The British feared more for the patriotic poems of the great Bharati than for the swords of the revolutionaries. It Was his poems which inspired the great revolutionary Wanchinathan to shoot and kill Collector Ash at Klaniyachi near Tirunelveli in Tamil Nadu. It wag his poems which inspired the great freedom fighter V. O. Chidambaram Pillai to launch his first navigational Swadeshi Ship, competing with the British, to Sri Lanka it was his poems which erupted like flames of volcano to inspire thousands of youngsters to brave the British bullets. His indignation over poverty was very remarkable.

His song was:

Thani Oruvanukku Unavillaiyenil Jagathinai Azhithiduvom'.

This means, if one individual is dep rived of fooa, we will destroy Also, whole world. his poetic butes to the Great October Revolution and to the liberation movements in Europe' very remarkabie are very and so was his great vision. It was who prophesied about freedom. He also dreamt about freedom. He was the first who gave the slogan, who dreamt about connecting the Cauvery. Ganges with the But suffered very much at

the hands of the British. Because of this, he had to live most of his iife in exile in Pondicherry. He suffered at the hands of the British. He i-suffered m penury and prosecution, trials and tribulations. Till his last breath, he suffered. As it happens in the case of many others who are remembered only after their death after many years, his contribution came to be recognised. Now, he has been recognised in many other \* countries. His works have been acknowledged and recognised in Soviet Russia, in France, in England, in Germany and als:0 in Japan." I am also very glad to say, Sir, that the West Bengal Government and the people in Calcutta have decided to erect a statue for Bhgrati in Calcutta. Therefore, at this juncture, it will be very proper to request the Central Government to release special postage stamps to honour the~ memory of Bharati, to name the Delhi University after Bharati and also to name the G.T. Express after Bharati, because it was he who dreamt and said that the Ganges should be connected with the Cauvery. Therefore, he should be honoured. For this: purpose the G.T. Express can be named after Bharati. The Delhi University can be named after Bharati. This is the wish not only of the people of Tamil Nadu, not only of the Tamil \*\* people living abroad, but this is the wish of all those people, of all those citizens, who cherish the heroic freedom struggle With these words, I conclude. Thank you.

SHRI L. K. ADVANI (Gujarat): Sir, I would strongly endorse what Mr. Gopalsamy has said. I would request the Government not merely to 'bring out a stamp, but so far as his writings are concerned, his poems are concerned, they should be translated into all the Indian languages. This is the occasion when it should be done because it is his birth centenary. I would strongly plead that something should be done to commemorate the memory of this great patriotic poet.

HAREKRUSHNA MALLICK (Orissa): A statue should be erected in Delhi.

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SHRI SHRIDHAR WASUDEO DHABE (Maharashtra): Sir, I support what Mr. Gopalsamy has said.

SHRI SANKAR PRASAD MITRA (West Bengal): Mr. Vice-Chairman, I thank you for permitting me to support the proposal made by Mr. Gopalsamy. Subramanya Bharati was a great poet, widely respected throughout India. Early in his We, he came in contact with Shri Aurobindo and was influenced by his revolutionary cult. Not only was he a great poet, he also made significant contributions to our freedom movement, which we should gratefully remember on the occasion of his birth centenary. I do hope that the Government would honour him by issuing a postal stamp in his memory and would also take other suitable steps to perpetuate his memory.
