> SilK1 ARVIND GANESS KULKARNI:

Will the Minister of TOURISM AND CIVIL AVIATION be pleased to state:

- (a) the details of facilities in res-' pect Of (i) housing and (ii) children's education that have been made available to the employees including officers working in ITDC, Government Hotels, and Tourist Centres all over the country during the last one year;
 - (b) whether the employees have "made any demands in this regard; if -SO, what are the details thereof; and
 - (c) whether there is any proposal under Government's consideration to meet the demands of these employees?

THE MINISTER OF TOURISM AND CIVIL AVIATION (SHRI A. P. SHARMA): (a) The ITDC is helping its employees by providing House Building Loan for construction/purchase of houses/flats. During 1980-81, a provision of Rs. 20 lakhs was made on this account. Out of this, about -- Rs. 17 lakhs has been disbursed upto 28.2,1981.

In addition, the employees are en titled to House Rent Allowance as per ITDC rules.

The employees have also formed a Housing Society namely, Paryatan Vihar Cooperative Group Housing Society Ltd., Delhi which is duly registered and has 1400 memlbers. Efforts are being made to secure allotment of land from DDA.

As regards facility of children's education, the ITDC has adopted the scheme of the Central Government in respect of itg employees.

(b) and (c) There has been a general demand from the employees '-for provision of staff quarters but the ITDC rules permit only the admissi-'ble House Rent Allowance.

Discovery of Mineral Deposits in Thar Desert

1755. SHRI HARVENDAR SINGH HANSPAL: Will the Minister of STEEL AND MINES be pleasod state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that huge deposits of potash, rock-salt, tungsten, lead and zinc have been found 1 y Indian geologists under the Thar desert;
- (b) if so, whether any proper assessment of the minerals has since been made; and
- (c) what is the estimated value an.d the exporf~potential thereof?

THE MINISTER OF COMMERCE .-AND STEEL AND MINES (SKRI PRANAB MUKHERJEE): fa) and (b) Huge deposits only of rock-salt at places containing minor amounts of potash minerals have so far been located in the Churu-Bikaner disi-ricts of Rajasthan. Occurrences of tungsten and deposits of lead and zinc mineral's have also been located in Rajasthan but they are not in the Thar desert region.

(c) value and the export po*'e"-tial of the deposits can be worked out only after completion of the investigations.

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE OF MINISTRY FINANCE (StIRI SAWAISINGH SISODIA): (a) The ^ Government of Punjab aoproached the Centre for special financial arrangements for expediting work on the Thein Project.

- The Government of India is (b) aware of the importance attached the project by the State Government,
- ~ but it is felt that there are other pro jects in the State in advanced stages Of completion, which, if adequately funded will start yielding benefits soon. The Centre has advised tlie Punjab Governmeat not to spread the available resources thinly over a lur^e number of projects.
- There is no proposal at present for availing of foreign assistance for any of the power projects in Punjab.

- (c) whether the Reserve Bank of India also proposes some other method to ensure that equality of opportunity in the matter of promotion is granted to its employees; if so, what are the details thereof; and
- (d) what steps have been taken fay Bank to ensure that the offij ?rs transferred actually proceed on trans fer instead of seeking reversion with a

view to continue to remain at the centre oi posting?

THE DEPUTY J'INISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF FINANCE MAGANBHAI BAROT): (a) The time taken for promotion of Grade III employees as staff o*i::ers Grade 'A' is different in various offices of Reserve Bank of India as the vacancies are filled on office-wise basis.

- (b) There is presently no proposal to have region-wise seniority.
- (c) The Bank has already undertaken consultation on this question with the employees' associations.
- (d) The transfer orders where issued are enforced by the bank unless there are compelling reasons of genuine personal hardship to the concerned officer.

Restriction imposed on (he Export 01 white pomfrets

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE CCSMERCE (SHRI MINISTRY OF KHURSHED ALAM KHAN): (a) Yes, Sir. The export of white pomfrets of sizes less than 300 grams is iibt allowed. Export of white pomfrets of sizes 300 grams and above but less than 500 grams is subject to quota restrictions. The export of white pomfrets of sizes 500 grams and above is allowed on OGL 'Basis.
