Autonomy to Government run hospitals

182. SHRI R.C. SINGH: Will the Minister of HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE be pleased to state:

(a) the details of budget provided by Government to hospitals run by it like Dr. Ram Manohar Lohia, AIIMS, etc., in the country, State-wise;

(b) whether it is a fact that Government is planning to give autonomy to some Government hospitals like Ram Manohar Lohia Hospital, etc.;

(c) whether Government is asking the above hospitals to stand on their own by generating their own resources; and

(d) if so, the details thereof?

THE MINISTER OF HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE (SHRI GHULAM NABI AZAD): (a) In respect of Central Government Hospitals in Delhi including All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS), Post-graduate Institute of Medical Education and Research (PGIMER), Chandigarh, Jawaharlal Institute of Post-graduate Medical Education and Research (JIPMER), Puducherry, North Eastern Indira Gandhi Regional Institute of Health & Medical Sciences (NEIGRIHMS), Shillong and Regional Institute of Medical Sciences (RIMS), Imphal, the details of budget provided by the Government during the Financial Year 2010-11 are as under:

Proper implementation of immunization programmes

183. SHRIMATI SHOBHANA BHARTIA: Will the Minister of HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE be pleased to state:

(a) whether immunization programmes targeted at reducing child mortality are not being properly implemented in several parts of the country;

(b) if so, the details thereof;

(c) whether Government has formulated any policy or plans to ensure the proper implementation of these programmes; and

(d) if so, the details thereof?

THE MINISTER OF HEALTH AND FAMILY WELFARE (SHRI GHULAM NABI AZAD): (a) and (b) Immunization programmes are being implemented with different degree of success in different states. State-wise figures for full immunization coverage as per DLHS-III (2007-08) are given in Statement (See below).

Reasons for low performance in some of the states are weak health infrastructure, shortage of human resources, lack of proper monitoring & supervision etc.
