- (b) whether there is any proposal under Government's consideration to subsidise agriculture inputs required particularly by marginal farmers; and
- (c) whether there is any scheme for shifting the extra hands of rural poor engaged at present, in agriculture on economic holdings, and if so, what progress has been made in the matter so far?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE (SHRI R. V. SWAMINATHAN): (a) The Government have taken the following steps to reduce the impact of recent increase in prices of fertilisers:—

- (i) The Agricultural Prices Commission have been asked to rework the support prices of crops beginning from Kharif, 1980 season after taking into consideration the recent increase in the prices of fertilisers. They have since submitted their supplementary report. Their recommendations for prices of paddy and coarse cereals, like, jowar, bazra, maize and ragi have been discussed in the recent Conference of the Chief Ministers held on 27th July, 1980. The Government will take decision in this regard shortly;
- (ii) The existing subsidy on fertilisers to small and marginal farmers in drought affected areas would continue during the current financial year;
- (iii) Reserve Bank of India have heen requested to ensure adequate credit to farmers and to distribution agencies. They have since issued instructions to all Cooperatives and Scheduled Commercial Banks accordingly;
- (iv) Fertilisers will henceforth be delivered at the block headquarters instead of rail heads. The additional transportation cost will be borne by the Government of India; and

(v) The availability of the shortterm credit given by the Government of India has been doubled for the current Kharif season.

In the context of the above steps taken by the Government, increased prices of fertilisers may not affect agricultural production of the country.

(b) Under the special programme Development Small farmers Agency/Integrated Rural Development, etc., the small and marginal farmers are provided subsidy for the purchase of phosphatic and potassic fertilisers. The rate of subsidy is 25 per cent and 33-1/3 per cent in case of small and marginal farmers res-For those belonging pectively. scheduled tribes out of the above categories the subsidy is 50 per cent. Under the demonstration programme of the SFDA and IRD, inputs, like seed, fertilisers including nitrogenous fertilisers, pesticides etc. are subsidised @ Rs. 200|- per 1|2 acre demonstration.

In addition, the existing subsidy to the small and marginal farmers on agricultural inputs in drought affected areas will continue during the current year.
