ANJIAH): (a) According t₀ the available provisional information, there were 3.14 million man-days lost due to strikes and 2.87 million mandays lost d^e to lockouts, during January to May, 1980. The information for the month of June, 1980 is not yet available.

- (a) whether Pakistan nuclear bid in collusion with the Western countries is creating conditions in the Indian penisula for peace and healthy relations; if so, what are the details in this regard;
- (b) whether Government's attention has been drawn towards the Year Book 1980 issued by the International Peace Research Institute, Stockholm under which Pakistan is involved in regional arms race with India in the wake of development in Iran and Afghanistan; if so, what are the details in this regard?

THE MINISTER OP fcFr"»WIAL AFFAIRS (SHRI P. V. NARASIMHA RAO): (a) Reports about Pakistan's

efforts to acquire nuclear weapons capability have been a matter of concern for the Government or India as this would work against peace and stability. Government of India; have taken up this matter with the Government of Pakistan at the highest levels. The Government of Pakistan have given an assurance that their nuclear programme is solely directed towards peaceful purposes and has n© non-peaceful dimensions. It is hoped that the Government of Pakistan would abide by this assurance.

(b) Yes, Sir. According to the report, Pakistan accounted for 28 per cent of the major armsim ports into the region during the mcs.

THE MINISTER OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI P. V. NARASIMHA RAO): (a) Yes, (Sir.

(b) In 1977 at the Colombo Plan Consultative Conference held at Kathmandu, His Majesty the King of Nepal called for regional cooperation in the field of water resources development between Nepal, India, China, Bhutan, Bangladesh, Pakistan and Sri Lanka. During his visits to neighbouring countries, namely, Sri

Lanka, Bangladesh and India, m early 1980, H. M. the King of Nepal discussed and expressed his country's interest in promoting regional co operation, a policy which he subsequently reiterated in his address to the Rashtriya Panchayat on June 22, 1980. Nepal has formally supported the Bangladesh Presidents proposal for a South Asian summit Confer, ence. The Nepalese Foreign Secretary recently visited Sri Lanka, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Bhutan and India t₀ hold "regional consultations and discuss this idea. Nepal's call fo_r regional cooperation is thus not a new phenomenon.

Nepal has repeatedly assured us that her policy of regional cooperation does not in any way preclude bilateral cooperation with India in mutually agreed project*
