

WFLCOJJE TO NEWLY ELECTED MEMBERS

There is unnecessary recrimination. Perhaps a little more tolerance and a little less recrimination will make things pleasant and the task lighter for all of us. The eyes of the Nation are upon us and our doings and we must do our best for the Nation as a whole.

And now I welcome the new Members again and invite them to take a

proper share in the work of the House. We shall now proceed to the work which is before us.

OBITUARY REFERENCES

MR. CHAIRMAN: I refer with profound sorrow to the passing away of President Josip Broz Tito of Yugoslavia and to the passing away of Shri Jethalal Hari Krishna Joshi, Shrimati Shyam Kumari Khan, Shri Kasu Vengala Reddy, Shri Mahavir Tyagi and Shri P. Abraham, ex-Members of this House.

President Josip Broz Tito of Yugoslavia, as the Members are aware, had been ailing after amputation of a leg owing to blood circulation problems, in January last. He was one of the great leaders of our times. With his passing away the world has lost the last of surviving Generals who led the course of events in the Second World War. Though he came to occupy this position from the ruins of a World War, he will be remembered for the cause of peace which he espoused fervently after the war along with our late Prime Minister, Jawaharlal Nehru.

President Tito was born in a poor peasant family of Yugoslavia in 1892. He started his career as an apprentice mechanic, but was soon drafted
