(b) if so, what is the number of such persons repatriated to India during the last three years;

(c) how many of them are Indian citizens;

(d) what is the number of persons of Indian origin now left in Burma; and

(e) whether it is a fact that a vast majority of persons amongst them are eligible for the Burmese citizenship but a very few have been formally granted the Burmese citizenship so far?

THE MINISTER OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI P. V. NARASIMHA RAO):
(a) Yes, Sir.

(b) 1857.

(c) Most of the repatriates were documentless persons of Indian origin.

(d) No authentic figures are available. However, according to our Embassy's estimate there are still between 3 or 4 lakhs persons of Indian descent in Burma.

(e) Yes, Sir. Many persons of Indian origin are, ipso facto Burmese citizens under the Constitution and Citizenship Laws of Burma, though in many cases they might not have acquired Burma Union Citizenship Certificates.

Maintenance of record of late running Mail/Express trains

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS?
(SHRI C. K. JAFFAR SHARIEF):
(a) "Yes.

(b) The information relating to over 250 pairs of Mail/Express trains for a period of 14 months is very voluminous and the collection of *Ms data besides requiring considerable time and effort may not serve any useful purpose. This information is however being maintained in the form of average punctuality percentage of Mail/Express trains on the Zonal Railways which for the relevant period was as under: —
