Role of Indian Government in solving the Afghan issue

Will the Minister of EXTERNAL AFFAIRS be pleased to state:

- (a) what are the details of the Indian formula to resolve the Afghan crisis and what are the names of the countries which share India's view;
- (b) whether India is able to bridge the gap between the Soviet and the Western positions and find a suitable forum for voicing its views of solving the Afghan crisis; and
- (c) what steps the Government of India have taken to resolve the Afghan crisis?

THE MINISTER OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI P. V. NARASIMHA RAO): (a) There is no "Indian formula" as such for resolving the Afghan situation.

- (b) Government of India has been having meaningful consultations with a number of countries with a view to finding ways and means of defusing the situation in the region and for moving towards creation of conditions which would facilitate Soviet troop withdrawal from Afghanistan.
- (c) Towards this end Government of India have consulted with the following Countries: Britain, Bangladesh, France, Australia, Austria, Iraq, USSR, Yugoslavia, Algeria, Hungary, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Nepal, Afghanistan, USA, Canada, Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Iran and Japan. Although as of now there is no clear plan of
