The Detailed Project Report envisages that the project will be set up in two stages. In the first stage, the facilities to produce cold rolled stainless steel sheets and strips of 32,000 tonnes per year from purchased hot rolled coils would be established. The balance facilities for iron and steel-making, hot rolling and cold rolling of stainless electrical and other special steels, starting from iron ore and scrap would be established in the second stage.

The first stage of the Salem Steel Plant $i_{\rm s}$ now undr execution and production is expected to commence towards the end of 1981. No decision has yet been taken on the implementation of fho second stage of the project.
