(d) Some of the steps taken by the Government to reduce the dropout rate are:

- Education has been made free for all children between 6 to 14 years.
- Monitoring of attendance by the community.
- Micro planning and household survey to identify the dropouts and reasons therefor.
- Organising retention drives.
- Improving the quality of teaching to retain children in school.
- Organising bridge courses/back to school camps etc. to bring the dropouts back into school.
- Providing cooked midday meal to boost the efforts towards "universalisation of primary education" by increasing enrolment, retention and attendance and simultaneously impacting on the nutrition of students in primary classes.
