Statement

The Session carried out a review of the coordinated technical plan and considered work programme for 1976—78 which covered various subject like meteorological component, hydrological component, community preparedness and disaster prevention etc. Work programme was drawn up for the member-countries which *inter-alia* included the following:

- (1) Establishment of a radiowing observatory at Car Nicobar.
- (2) Establishment of a ground station with facilities for reception of data from polar orbiting satellites carrying scanning radiometers.
- (3) Establishment of simple automatic weather stations on islands and reefs in the Bay of Bengal and the Arabian Sea. 1 6 RSS'76-2

- (4) Use of drifting and anchored buoys in the cyclone areas of the Bay of Bengal and the Arabian Sea.
- (5) Expansion of number of recording raingauge stations and radio reporting stations and improvement of communication facilities in general.

The countries concerned will be taking appropriate action on the recommendations concerning them. So far as Government of India are concerned, India Meteorological Department are taking necessary action.
