

Hindustan Milk Food

*385. SHRI GANESH LAL MALI: Will the Minister of INDUSTRY AND CIVIL SUPPLIES be pleased to state:

(a) whether it is a fact that one of the conditions imposed in the industrial licence issued to M/s. Hindustan Milk Food Manufacturers in February, 1971 for setting up a new unit at Rajmundry in Andhra Pradesh for manufacture of malted food under the brand name 'Horlicks' was to change over to a new Indian name within three years of the unit going into production;

(b) if so, when the unit went into production;

(c) whether the above condition has been waived by Government;

(d) if so, the reasons therefor;

(e) whether it is fact that the continuance of foreign brand name overshadows the growth and development of various small scale units manufacturing malted food; and

(f) whether Government propose to reimpose the condition and if not the reasons therefor?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF INDUSTRY AND CIVIL SUPPLIES (SHRI B. P. MAURYA): (a) Yes, Sir.

(b) In April, 1973.

(c) Yes, Sir.

(d) The condition was waived by the Government in January, 1973 on receipt of a representation from the Company that the condition would hamper viability of the new unit set up in the backward area of Andhra Pradesh, and would also adversely affect marketability of the product particularly in the export market in competition with other companies having established brand names.

(e) and (f). The application by M/s. Horlicks, Ltd., U.K. under S. 28(1) (c) of the Foreign Exchange regulation Act, 1973 for permission of the use of their brand names by Hindustan Milk Food Manufacturers Limited is

under the consideration of the Reserve Bank of India.

Radio Station at each District Headquarters

(i) Singrauli in the Northern Region

(ii) Kobra in the Western Region.

(iii) Farakka in the Eastern Region.

(iv) Neyveli and Ramagundam in the Southern Region.

Production of Essential Commodities

*389. SHRI SANAT KUMAR RAHA: Will the Minister of INDUSTRY AND CIVIL SUPPLIES be pleased to state what steps Government have taken for production of essential commodities and their supply to the under-developed area and under privileged people during the emergency period?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF INDUSTRY AND CIVIL SUPPLIES (SHRI A. C. GEORGE): A statement is laid on the Table of the House.

Statement

Production of Essential Commodities

For the purpose of public distribution system, Government have indentified 17 essential commodities. These include agricultural commodities as well as manufactured articles. The steps taken for production of agricultural commodities relate to various aspects such as research, extension, inputs etc. As regards manufactured commodities, steps taken for production include fuller utilisation of installed capacity, streamlining the licensing procedure, improved supply of power and other inputs.

For supply of essential commodities so as to reach under developed areas and under-privileged people, States have been advised to expand the public distribution system. In doing so, States have been requested to give priority to vulnerable areas like labour concentration in mining, industrial and plantation areas hill areas and rural areas in the districts which are chronically scarcity affected and the coverage of vulnerable and poor section of the population. Furthermore, steps were taken to monitor the

availability, movement and prices of essential commodities.

Group Insurance Scheme for Coal Mine Workers

THE MINISTER OF ENERGY (SHRI K. C. PANT) : (a) and (b) Coal India Limited, a public sector undertaking, under the Ministry of Energy, is examining the outlines of a scheme for group insurance for coalmine workers in case of fatal and serious accidents.

(c) and (d) The matter is still under discussion between the Coal India Limited and the Life Insurance Corporation of India.
