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National Dairy Development Board, they have now agreed that this bulk distribution system is suited to Indian conditions provided the deficiencies in their operation are removed to make the equipmen! technically sufficiently sound.

- (d) The bulk milk vending machines are in operation in Maxico city.
- (e) The working of the processing, transportation and bulk milk vending system of Mexico City Milk Plant with special reference to its applicability to Indian conditions was studied by an Expert Team deputed to Mexico City by National Dairy Development Board in June, 1972. The study report commends the acceptance of Mexican bulk vending concept, particularly for meeting the requirements of poorer sections of our urban population, subject however, to improvements being made in the technical aspects of the system in the light of experience gained in Mexico City. This corroborates the views earlier expressed by other experts whom Government consulted, namely U. K. Milk Marketing Board and Dairy Experts of F. A. O. W. F. P. and UNICFF.

After careful consideration, Government have authorised the introduction of bulk milk vending machines subject to rectification of deficiencies noticed and the adoption of the prescribed tendering and procurement procedures. This decision has been taken in the interest of quick and massive expansion of milk distribution facilities, addition to the existing bottle supply which will continue. The supply of milk through bulk milk vending machines will reduce costs involved in bottling and will also cut down, the transport cost. The milk is attached.

will be available for longer periods during the day as compared to the limited hours of supply from milk distribution depots in the morning and evenings and will reduce long queues. The quality of milk supplied through bulk milk vending machine will be better as compared to the bottled milk because it would be possible to maintain the temperature of the milk supplied through bulk vending machines at 5°C. The Nation-Dairy Development Board lises that within a year or so of these bulk vending machines at 5 C. The Nationindigenous, manufacture will be able to fill the country's needs for such equipment.

GOVERNMENT'S INABILITY TO PRO-VIDE MANURE AND FERTILISERS TO AGRICULTURISTS

62 DR. BHAI MAHAVIR. SHRI JAGDISH PRA! AD MATHUR: SHRI O. P. TYAGI:

Will the Minister of AGRICULTURE be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that Government are unable to provide manure and fertilisers to the agriculturists according to their requirements;
- (b) whether Government also realise that due to the shortage of fertilisers and water it is not possible to get higher production from the improved seeds; and
- (c) if so, whether Government have evolved any measure to meet the shortage?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE (SHRI ANNASAHEB SHINDE): (a) It is a fact that there is some constraint in the availability of fertilisers due to difficulties in domestic product and imports. It is expected, however, that a substantial part of farmers' requirements of fertilizers would be met during the year 1973-74.

(b) and (c) It is possible to minimise eflects of fertilizer and water constraints through better management of available inputs.

In order to obtain maximum agricultural production from the available fertilizers, the States have been requested to prepare plans for using fertilizer on priority crops like high-yielding varities of cereals and export oriented crops and to make distribution arrangements accordingly. Even on these crops, the Indian Council of Agricultural Research has advised various measures such as better better water management, better plant protection, better weeding and more balanced fertilization in order to maximise production with the available stocks.

Government are also making all-out efforts to increase the capacity utilisation of the domestic fertilizer units and to import fertilifiers from all possible sources to meet the requirements in full.

EFFECTS OF THE COMBINATION OF **DRUGS**

- 63. SHRI SHYAMLAL GUPTA: Will the Minister of HEALTH AND FAMILY I'LANNING be pleased to state:
- (a) whether Government are aware of the fact that combination of antibiotics of sulfa drugs and antibiotics exposed the patients to possible side effects;
- (b) whether the Essential Drugs Committee has initiated a study on the effectiveness of the various combination of drugs used in India; and
- (c) what steps are taken for providing clinical and laboratory facilities in the country so that the combination of drugs are examined for the study of side effect?

(c) Clinical facilities of a limited extent. are already available in the country, for carrying out studies on the combination of drugs.
