India has noted with satisfaction that progress is being made towards peaceful settlements in Indo-China.

There was no suitable house available at a cheaper rent at that time. Rents in Hong Kong are continuing to rise. When the present lease is due to expire we will try to fit d a cheaper house for the Commissioner.

THE MINISTER OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SARDAR SWARAN SINGH):
(a) and (b) Regular contacts, both at the political and economic levels, have been maintained between the two countries in the spirit of the Indo-Soviet Treaty of Peace, Friendship and Cooperation.

There had been a full exchange of views with Soviet leaders in December 1972 when the Vice-President and I had been in Moscow to attend the 50th anniversary celebrations of the USSR. Recently, the Indo-Soviet Commission held its first meeting in New Delhi in February, 1973 when an agreed protocol covering bilateral economic cooperation over a wide field had been concluded.
