(c) and (d) Hindustan Copper Limited have plans to increase the rate of copper production to about 57,000 tonnes per annum by the end of 5th Plan period and to about 80,000 tonnes per annum in about 10 years from now. The production programme will substantially meet the requirement of the country. However, as the consumption of copper is expected to grow at a fast pace it will take considerable time to build up sufficient indigenous capacity to attain self-sufficiency.

- (a) whether Government's attention has been invited to a book entitled "The Cairo Documents" by Mr. Mohamed Heikal, Chief Editor of Al Ahram, a semi-official Egyptian newspaper in which serious allegations have been levelled against the former Prime Minister, Pandit Jawahar Lal Nehru about his conduct on country's affairs;
- (b) what is Government's reaction to the observation of Mr. Heikal to the effect that a number of Indian Parliamentarians were on the pay roll of industralists; and

The book contains many controversial remarks against well-known world leaders, as well as Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru, Indian Parliamentarians, etc. These observations are either conjectural, based on incorrect and secondhand reports or obvious exaggerations and distortions. While Government is sorry to see that these reflections have been made by a well-known author from a country very friendly to India, they do not believe that any useful purpose would be served by pursuing this matter further with a private individual.
