(a) whether Government's attention has been drawn to the U. S. Defence Secretary, Mr. Malvin Laird's remarks about the possibility of naval presence of Japan in the Indian Ocean ; and

(b) if so, what is Government's reaction thereto ?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI SURENDRA PAL SINGH) : (a) Yes, Sir.

(b) Government have also noted the statement of the Japanese Foreign Office spokesman on the 30th of March 1972 who, commenting on the U. S. Defence Secretary's remarks, said that there was no plan at the moment for the Japanese Defence forces to be active in the Indian Ocean ; and further that it was neither possible nor desirable for them to do so. Government continue to adhere to their well-known policy of attaining a zone of peace in the Indian Ocean.
