THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF EDUCATION AND SOCIAL WELFARE (SHRI D. P. YADAV): (a) and (b) A proposal to this effect was made in the first meeting of the National Committee for International Book Year. This matter is yet to be further considered by the Committee. The proposal is in preliminary stage and no details have been finalized.

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF EDUCATION AND SOCIAL WE FARE (SHRI D. P \ ADAV) (a) to (e) On. of the employees of the Salar Jung Museum had reported the loss of 44 miniature paintings from on stores on 29,5 72. The Salar Jung Auseum Board have catrusted the investigations to the local Police authorities. The report of the Police authorities is awaited.

In the wake of the reported loss of paintings, some newspaper reports and com-

plaints have been received by the Government. Accordingly, the Central Bureau of Investigations has also been requested to make investigations. The Government has also received some representations from the staff association alleging corruption and mal-practices.

The Salar Jung Museum is an autonomous body functioning under a Board with the Governor of Andhra Pradesh as its Chairman. The Board is fully competent to take all necessary steps for the efficient management of the Museum and to look into the service conditions of all categories of its employees,

For th s, ne / insectisides also have been intr di ced viz BHC and Malathion which are several times more expensive than the conventional DDT. The insecticide DDT has been produced in advance during 1971 for supply to the States during 1972-73 for In certain unit areas where spray in time the vector is found resistant to DDT, BHC is being used, and in the States of Maha-

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rashtra and Gujarat, in certain localities where the vector is found to be resistant to both DDT and BA C, and organophosphorous compound 'Malathion' is being procured and supplied.
