SOFT LOANS TO KERALA FOR COIR INDUSTRY

*26. SHRI N. K. KRISHNAN: SHRI S. KUMARAN:

Will the Minister of FOREIGN TRADE be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that Government had agreed to provide soft loans to the State of Kerala for reorganising the coir industry in the State;
- (b) whether any such loans have been given to far; and
- (c) if not, the reasons for the delay in providing such assistance?

THE **DEPUTY** MNISTER OF FOREIGN TRADE (SHRI A. C. CTEORGE): (a) to (c) A statement is laid on the Table of the House.

STATEMENT

A request for the grant of a soft-loan of Rs. 1.50 for re-vitalising the coir industry in Kerala has been received from the State Government. They were asked to send a soundly conceived programme for revitalising the industry so

as to make it self-supporting and viable. The proposal sent by them mainly related to revitalising 25 cooperative societies. Steps proposed to be taken to ensure that the societies would become viable and credit worthy had not been indicated. The State Government also did not indicate how and in what time, the amount was to be recovered. They were informed that unless future viability and satisfactory working of the societies was ensured interim assistance would not be of abiding value. It was proposed to send a team of officers to discuss the steps proposed to be taken in this regard, with the State Government

authorities. The State Government have not accepted this proposal.
