### STATEMENT

Export of mill-made cotton textiles during April, 1970—January, 1971 amounted to Rs. 88.65 crores as compared to Rs. 92.98 crores of the corresponding period last year, showing a decline of Rs. 4.33 crores.

The news item appearing in the 'Economic Times' dated 12th February, 1971 has come to notice of the Government.

This decline is mainly due to a poor domestic cotton crop this year, resulting in sharp rise in prices. Lack of necessary modernisation by the Mills is also a contributory factor.

Government have taken various steps to arrest this trend. These steps include:—

- (i) Regulating stringently stocks, credit control and other trading faci- vlities to arrest rise in prices of cotton.
- (ii) arranging import of large quantity of foreign cotton.
- (iii) allotment of foreign cotton to exporting mills.
- (iv) encouraging moderanisation of exporting mills by arranging soft loans and allowing import of machinery.
