- (ii) In order to 1c :aUse thefts, seal checking is done at every (hecking point;
- (iii) Yards and Goods sheds etc. are watched round the clock by the R. P. F.;
- (iv) Trains carryi ig valuable commodities are escorted by the B. P. F.;
- (v) Vulnerable I -ctors, yards/spots are patrolled by the R P. F. wilh or without arms or by R. P. F. 3 og Squads;
- (vi) In order to 1< calise bad pols, a Pilot Scheme has been intr >duced on selected pairs of stations on differei t railways, which include transhipment points, where loading and unloading of affected commodities is closely supervised;
- (vii) Plain clothe staff of R. P. F. are deployed to collect i itelligence with a view to tracking down crimii als;
- (viii) Special det ctive staff are detailed to collect intelligent t regarding receivers of stolen property and raids are organised on their shops/godowns with the assistance of Police:

INCREASE IN PRICES OP IRON AND STEEL

254. SHRI LOKANATH MISRA : SHRI NIRANJAN VARMA :

Will the Minister of STEEL AND HEAVY ENGINEERING be pleased to state s

- (a) whether the prices of iron and steel have recently increased considerably;
- (b) whether such increase in their prices has adversely affected the industry;
- (c) what is the percentage increase in the prices of iron during the year 1970-71 as compared to that of the year 1969-70; and
- (d) whether there are any proposals under Government's consideration to bring down the prices of iron and steel; and if so, the details thereof?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF STEEL AND HEAVY ENGINEERING (SHRI MOHD. SHAFI QURESHI): (a) The JPC prices and HSL stockyard prices of iron and steel have remained unchanged since 1.1.1970.

- (b) Does not arise.
- (c) JPC prices of Pig Iron were revised upwards by an average of Rs. 36.50 per tonne with affect from 1.1.1970, forming about 9% of the original average price.
- (d) There is no proposal at present to bring down the JPC prices.
