# IMPLEMENTATION OF THE INDO-CEYLON PACT

- 331. SHRI K. L. N. PRASAD: Will the Minister of EXTERNAL AFFAIRS be pleased to state:
- (a) whether it is a fact that much progress has not been made in the implementation of the Indo-Ceylon Pact;
- (b) if so, the reasons therefor and the progress made so far in this regard;
- (c) how many persons have so far arrived in India from Ceylon under the Pact; and
- (d) how many Indians have been given Ceylonese citizenship under the same?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI SURENDRA PAL SINGH): (a) & (b) The necessity to make various prior arrangements had somewhat delayed actual repatriation under the terms of the Indo-Ceylon Agreement of 1964. Now that these arrangements have been completed, the two Governments are discussing how best the provisions of the Agreement can be implemented faster.

- (c) 25,528 stateless persons were granted Indian citizenship and repatriated to India under the 1964 Agreement upto March 20, 1971.
- (d) 11,453 stateless persons were accepted as Ceylon citizens upto the end of October 1970.

# OFFICE MEMORANDUM

PAK TROOPS CONCENTRATION ON INDO-PAK BORDER

334. SHRI JAGDISH PRASAD MATHUR: Will the Minister of DE-FENCE be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that of late Pakistan Army has been concentrating their forces on the other side of the cease-fire line in Kashmir;
- (b) whether it is also a fact that Pakistan have set up 24 sabotage training centres in Poonch, Chakoli, Mirpur and at other places in occupied Kashmir where more than 10,000 persons are being trained in guerilla warfare and subversive activities by Chinese; and
- (c) if so, the reaction of the Government of India in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE (SHRI JAGJIVAN RAM): (a) There is at present, no unusual concentration of Pakistani troops across the Cease Fire Line in J. & K.

(b) and (c) Government are aware of the existence of training centres in Pakistan occupied Kashmir where training is imparted to persons in guerilla tactics, sabotage and other subversive activities. There is however no confirmation of the presence of Chinese instructors. The developments in this regard have been taken into account in our operational plans.
