rabsorb all the unemployed. The question is: if this is not possible immediately, should one not try to give more employment to these highly skilled and highly educated young men who today are feeing very frustrated, and the very resourceful young men who otherwise might have got dealerships of these oil companies would probably be able to think of something else?

SHRI AKBAR ALI KHAN: Sir. diversification to some extent, pointed out by the honourable Minister, may be advisable, but I would like the Government to explore avenues of the technical type which would employ the skills of these engineers, as, for instance, rural housing. There are many tractors and instruments which cannot be worked because there is nobody to help them in the rural areas. So such avenues should be explored and they should be concentraited upon.

SHRI K. C. PANT: That is quite correct. And as I said earlier, these avenues have been explored. I have tried to avoid burdening the House with a detailed list of all the steps that have been taken because they have been included in the statement attached to Question No 420. I hope that rural service station is also one of the schemes which are included in There are 16 or 17 schemes. If the hon. Member likes I can give all the details about the steps being taken to employ engineers in pursuits which are primarily meant for them. Diversification is important after that.

SHRI AKBAR ALI KHAN: I shall be very greatful.

TRANSFER OF OFFICERS

*613, SHRI A, G, KULKARNI†: SHRI N. P. CHAUDHARY: SHRI T. G, DESHMUKH:

Will the PRIME MINISTER be

pleased to state whether Government have any policy to transfer officers of the status of Deputy Secretary, Joint Secretary and Secretary every three years in order to improve efficiency in working; and if so, the number of such officers who have not been transferred from their posts for more than three years as on June 30, 1970?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF HOME AFFAIRS AND DEVELOPMENT OF PERSONNEL IN THE CABINET SECRETARIAT (SHRI RAM NIWAS MIRDHA): No, Sir. There is no such policy.

SHRI A. G. KULKARNI: Is it a fact that for maintaining efficiency in the administration, sometimes changes are necessary, say, every two years or three years? I wanted particularly to know what is the policy of the government in this connection in regard to transfer of officers. Secondly, regarding the continuance of the expertise particularly in offices of government where purchases and sales are made, have the government made any studies of their behaviour to particular subjects?

SHRI RAM NIWAS MIRDHA: It is true that in some cases turnover of officers is limited and the policy of the government in this respect is that in post of Under Secretary and equivalent the average deputation period should be 3 years; in posts of Deputy Secretary and equivalent, it should be 4 years and in posts of Director. Joint Secretary and above it should be 5 years.

SHRI BHUPESH GUPTA: And Secretaries?

SHRI RAM NIWAS MIRDHA: Five years.

SHRI BHUPESH GUPTA. What are you talking? For 27 years, 17 years and 18 years officers have stuck to their posts in one Ministry.

SHRI RAM NIWAS MIRDHA: I will give figures. The hon. Member probably wants to know in how many

SHRI RAM NIWAS MIRDHA: As I said, the policy of the government is to rotate o'ficers after certain periods and every effort is made to see that tenures of these officers are not extended. It is only in very exceptional circums tances that the prescribed period is extended.

MURAHARI: SHRI GODET would like to krow why the government has made an exception in the case of these 68 officers. It is well known that there are certain officers who are powerful enough to get themselves extended in the same department. I would like to know why government doe not make it a rule that nobody shall be given any extension. I think even this five year period is long. 'They should be transferred every three years.

SHRI RAM NIWAS MIRDHA: is true that in some cases exceptions are made. In matters of administration, it would be very difficult make a very rigid time rule. Extensions would have to be given in certain cases. But I would assure the hon. Members .hat whenever an exception is sought for, there is a very 1595 RSD-2
