- (b) and (c) In allotting work on the Farakka Barrage Project, the authorities have to lake into consideration the tenderers' technical and financial capability to undertake the type of job tendered, their ability to complete the job by the stipulated dates, their resources regarding the right type and number of machinery to be brought to site, requirements of foreign exchange etc. The tenders for all the major works of the Project are considered by a high level Tender Committee of officials, consisting of technical experts and the representatives of the Ministry of Finance and the administrative Ministry. The tenders for the Bagmari Syphon were also accordingly considered by this Committee. After taking the above factors into consideration, the Committee came to the conclusion that it would not be advisable to entrust the work of this magnitude and nature to the lowest tenderer.
- (c) The work has been completed in two working seasons as contemplated.
