The incidence of inter-party clashes aiter the issue of he Presidential Proclamation in respect o 'West Bengal has been lower than during the period when the United Front Gov rnment was in power. Detailed informath 1 is awaited from the Government of We t Bengal in regard to the number of inter paity clashes in each, district, the names (Etfae parties involved, the places where si ch clashes took place and the number of p nsons killed or injured in each case.

Suitable action mder law has been initiated in respect erf specific incidents and investigations a e being pursued vigorously. By way of p eventive action police pickets have been :stablished in areas Dhere trouble has been apprehended.

Systematic searches have been organised and considerable quantities of arms ammunition allegedly in unauthorised possession had been recovered. Action* under law has also been initiated in respect of known bad*characters.

SHRI KALYAN ROY: I think the Home Minister will agree with me that a dangerous situation has been created in West Bengal where the employers and the rich landlords have started large-scale retrenchment and eviction of peasants on the one hand and CPM violence continues unabated on the other hand. There is dogfight among the high officers for position and status. The whole administration is in a state of atrophy and entire Departments have gone into hibernation. Unfortunately the credit column of the administration under President's rule is blank, nil. I want to know from the Home Minister whether it is true thai the present standstill of the administration is a result of the friction within the Government. In other- words, I think his attention has been drawn to the \ery strong condem-nition by the IAS officers' association of the Governor. Is it the aim of the IAS association to shield their officers who are not taking proper steps or is it because the Governor is not pulling on well with the high officers?

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: I know there were certainly some initial difficulties some of which are yet to be overcome. But I must say that in the last few weeks the upper structure of the State administration has started functioning. I do not deny that there were some difficulties in the initial period, but I think if we give them co-opeiation and understanding for some time, they will assert themselves and bring about that efficiency which is necessary.

SHRI KALYAN ROY: Will the Home Minister tell us whether it is not true that the Commissioner of Police, Calcutta, Mr. P. K. Sen, is totally failing to restore law and order? As you have seen yesterday in Calcutta, in Beliaghata, the Communirt Pasty Marxists attacked the Forward Block people. Both he and tin I.G. of Police, West Bengal, are trying to go on leave in order to evade their responsibility. May I know if the leave has been granted? Secondly, has he received from Members of Parliament serious allegations against the Addl. S. P. of Asan-sol who is to look after law and order in Q urgapur, in the coal belt, where many

murders are taking place, that tbisAddl. S.P. is going about with the murderers, instead of arresting them? He is shielding those who should have been arrested. What has h- got to say about *tl* e Addl. S.P. Asaniol, whether he is going to be removed? Also what I as he to say about the Commissioner of Police, Calcutta and the I.G. of Police, West Bengal?

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: As far as the Addl. S. P. of Asansol is concerned, the hon. Member himself made complaints to me and I am having them looked into. Some other M. Ps. had mentioned the same thing to me. As far as the Commissioner of Police of Calcutta is concerned, he mentioned about certain leave application, etc. I think he had applied for leave before retirement, and that matter is under consideration.

SHRI KALYAN ROY: Has he been granted tl e leave? What about the I.G. of Police?

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: As far as the I. G. of Police is concerned, I do not know. Regarding the Commissioner of Police, the officer wants to go on leave before retirement and that matte¹- is under consideration. If the request is granted, there is nothing wrong about it.

SHRI ANANT PRASAD SHARMA: After the imposition of the President's rule everybody had heaved a sigh of relief that at least the law and order situation would not improve after the dislodgement of the United Front which was mainly responsible for these things in that State. But even after the imposition of the President's rule so far as we could see today the position has not improved. On the other hand it has become impossible for any political party either to take out a p rocession or hold or conduct peaceful meetings. Everyday firing, looting and killing are going on on such occasions. May I know from the Home Minister what steps the Central Government is now proposing to take to improve the situation in Bengal and bring Bengal to a normal position of law and order?

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: I think it is better to take a correct view of the matter. I said that the situation has not returned to normal but even without going into the details I must say that a slight improvement is noticeeible. I am myself aware that it is not yet as satisfactory as we expect it to be. I have already gone

into the different aspects-murders that are taking place, the inter-party clashes that are taking place etc. But there is a certain improvement. In one matter, however, I cannot say that there is improvement, there is a deterioration and that is in the number of violent incidents by the I Naxalites particularly in Calcutta and round about areas.

SHRI DAHYABHAI V. PATEL : Why don't you ban them ?

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: That is a different

SHRI DAHYABHAI V. PATEL: Strai-j ghtforward action.

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: I wish it was so simple as that. So, the police administration has started asserting itself and a large number of Naxalities have been arrested. In certain cases some preventive action has also been taken, and investigation has been undertaken very energetically. As far as the police machinery, the Government machinery, is concerned, it has started functioning. I think we will have to give them some more time before passing any final judgement on this matter.

SHRI PRANAB KUMAR MOKHER-JEE: May I know whether he is aware of the fact that recently the IAS Association under the influence of Mr. Mur-shed, a pro-Marxist Officer, is creating a deadlock and has taken a completely non-co-operative attitude with the Governor? Is it also not a fact that a large number of district officers, practically supporters of the Marxist Communist Party, are not even doing their lawful duty when complaints of inter-party clashes are coming to them and violence is taking place? They are not discharging their lawful duty keeping in view that the Marxist Party will come into power. I want to now whether he is aware of the fact and, if so, what action he is going to take.

SHRI K. P. SUBRAMANIA MENON: How can he say pro-Marxist officers?

SHRI PRANAB KUMAR MUKHERJEE: That is a fact.

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: Of course very unfortunately a controversy is going on between the IAS Association and the Governor, but I would not make any sweeping judgement about this matter. I cannot say that all officers are noncooperating.

SHRI PRAT* AB KUMAR MUKHER-JEE: A gool number.

SHRI Y. B. 3H.AVAN: It is possible that some grou of officers here and there possibly may b< so, but we have to look at it very carefully find out the facts of every case and act ac oidingly. I would require the cooperation of the hon. House. When the whole thing is in the process of being set in order, if v e take a very partial view, rather an unkin view of our officers, possibly it will de noralise the entire apparatus. I think he House should show a little more patii ice and give a little more time before we pass any judgment.

SHRI A. D. (TAN!: According to the statement, by w; / i if preventive action police pickets have oein established in certain areas where trou ile has been apprehended, and systematic earchers have been organised. Accordir; to a Member from West Bengal I undei tand that in Ballygunge area, in Chow inghee area, in Central Avenue, people cannot walk about in the evenings.

SHRI KALi \N ROY : Old men should not be si ;n walking about in the Chowringhee ar

SHRI A. D. I4ANI: I am asking for information. WI. it are those areas where pickets have bee stationed? This is a very important quest in.

May I ask im also this question • Papers have pu ilished yesterday or the day before the lews that the Governor of West Bengal h is been repeatedly asking for the promulgation of the Preventive Detention Law. U this true or not?

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: The West Bengal Administi tion has made a suggestion to the Goveri ntnt of India about more powers, particul. Jy on the lines of preventive detention In the alternative, they have also sugge*:ed certain amendment to the Criminal Procedure Code. These are matters wher we cannot just act unilaterally. As the Consultative Committee for West Bengal *i* being constituted, we will have to pu the suggestions before that Committee.

SHRI THILL J VILLALAN: In West Bengal thei 5 have been a series of murders during t ie period of the United Front Government.

SHRI K. P. SUBRAMANIA MENON: They were there < arlier also.

SHRI THILLAI VILLALAN: Those murder were dubbed as political murders. When we put question regarding the political murders here the hon. Minister stated that law and order in the hands of the State Government. Now, Sir, we, find the very same series of murders continuing even during the President's rule I would like to know from the hon. Minister what special steps have been taken by this Government to stop those murders. Whether it is political or non-political, murder is murder. If the capital offence is committed continuously from the period of the United Front Government and the period of President rule....

MR. CHAIRMAN: What is the question?

SHRI THILLAI VILLALAN: I would like to know from the hon. Minister whether they have taken any special steps to stop this capital offence being committed continuously.

SHRI MAHAVIR TYAGI : They are ordinary murders.

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: I never said that political murders have stopped. I know of political murders, having taken place even during the President's rule. The only thing that I can say now is that the law machinery is asserting itself. Many arrests have been made and investigations have been undertaken more vigorously. That is the only thing I can say about it.

SHRI N. G. GORAY: In view of the prevailing suspicion about the partiality of the top officers in the Police De partment

AN HON. MEMBER: Governor also.

SHRI N. G. GORAY: I am confining myself only to the police officers. Wi" the Minister of Home Affairs conside^r whether it will be possible to indue* some efficient officers from outside for some time?

SHRI MAHAVIR TYAGI : That is not a popular way.

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: Merely sending officers from outside is not likely to help because it will create feeling of discontent among the services, instead of creating an atmosphere of co-operation. It will create more problems than it will slove

SHRI M. K. MOHTA: About the kind of activity that the Naxalites are indulging in West Bengal, even though the hon. Home Minister may say publicly that it may have to be tackled on a political front, I know that in his heart of hearts he knows that it cannot be done like that. What I want to ask the Minister is; What is the position of the Government regarding applying preventive detention in West Bengal?

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: I think I have answered this question.

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: I think we are discussing some explosive matter on the floor of this House. I think I did explain—I will repeat what I had said at that time—that most of the socalled boms or explosives are of local manufacture and the chemical material which is necessary for that is now a common requirement for industrial purposes in our country. It is not something special. Of course, in certain cases licences are required but possibly, they must be changing hands and ultimately reaching undesirable hands. That is the position.

SHRI K. P. SUBRAMANIA MENON: May I know whether during the President's rule which is otherwise benami Corgress rule, the Government has taken any decision to restore what are called the finds occupied by the peasants in West Bengal from the Jotedars, lands which were held benami by the Jotedars in violation of the Land Reforms Act of West Bengal and whether such efforts by the Government to restore the lands back to the Jotedars

are leading to further violence in the countrywide and whether the Government is going to implement this decision?

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: I think the hon. Member is misinterpreting the whole. thing.

SHRI KRISHAN KANT: As usual.

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: As usual I will explain this thing. Sir, the land problem is a very important problem as well as a very complex problem in the whole of the country and more particularly in West Bengal. Sir, the United Front Government lias passed two laws-very important laws they are-and the question is of implementing them. But the implementation has been made more complicated because of certain unauthorised occupations of a large number of acres of land. Now, Sir, the present administration has applied its mind to it and they are coming forward with certain suggestions. 1 think the principle wiil have to be ultimately that whatever the surplus land the West Bengal Government have got, that will have to be distributed amongst the landless, and this will be the guiding principle for the present administration as well. Therefore, I do not think the hon. Member can take the monopoly oi' being more progressive than we are.

SHRI ARJUN ARORA: May I know if the Governor or the Home Minister has considered the advisability of ascertaining the socioeconomic reasons for the increase in the number of the Naxalites in West Bengal and, if so, has the Government considered the advisability of ordering a socio economic study of the reasons for the rise in the number of the Naxalites there?

SHRI Y. B. CHAVAN: It is a very good suggestion.

SHRI S. S. MARISWAMY: Some time before the Home Minister said that there is improvement in the situation. unfortunately, that feeling cannot be shared by the people at large. When we open the newspapers we find nothing but murders in Calcutta, this place or that place. Now, Sir, my question is this. In view of the popular demand that the State Governor is not an impartial man, that he has got some confirmed views of certain political party or otherwise in simple words—which I hope the Home Minister would understand'—that he is supposed to be a coar-holder, in view of this

persistent rumour all over the country, would the Home* Minister take a bole decision in either sending the Governor to any other State or ousting him from West Bengal i order to bring about p and tranquill :y for the muchsuffered people of Wes Bengal?

SHRI Y. B CHAVAN: Government I have no prop, lal of transferring the Governor and tl e Government never works on the basis of rumours.

SHRI B. K KAUL: I would like to know from the hon. Home Minister if he is aware if the...
