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(b) No, Sir.

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(c) A close watch is being kept on the progress of works and necessary action is being taken with the co-operation of all the agencies concerned.

TRAINING CAMPS OF NAXALIIES IN ASSAM

967. SHRI M. K. MOHTA: Will the Minister of HOME AFFAIRS be pleas ed to state:

(a) whether it is a fact that Naxalites have established training camps in Goal-para and Cachar Districts of Assam and are having contacts with the extremists in East Pakistan for waging guerilla welfare;

(b) whether it is also a fact that there has been considerable tension in the border Districts of Assam as a result thereof; and

(c) if so, the steps taken by Government in the matter?

Amount spent hy CSIR on Pilot Plants

968. PROF. SAIYID NURL'L HASAN: Will the Minister of EDU CATION AND YOUTH SERVICES be pleased to state:

(a) what was the amount spent by the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research on pilot plants yearwise during the last five years;

(b) what is the proportion as compared to the expenditure on laboratory research and to the total budget; and

(cl whether this amount is considered adequate in the light of Prof. Blackett's

views on the developmental needs in the 'Innovation Chain' as elucidated by him at. the Nehru Memorial Lectures'?

THE MINISTER OF EDUCATION AND YOUTH SERVICES (PROF. V. K. R. V. RAO): (a) and (b) A Statement showing actual expenditure incurred on Pilot Plants as compared to the total expenditure in respect of 21 National Laboratories/Institutes where Pilot Plant work has been carried out during the last five years 1965-66. 1966-67. 1967-68, 1968-69 and 1969-70 is attached.

(c) Prof. Blackett is known to have among other views the following: —

(i) in the innovation chain, development is more expensive than research and

(ii) developing countries need reinvent and rediscover known km ledge and known processes.

The Pilot Plant Committee of the C.S.I.R. has stated that most pilot plants in the National Laboratories/Institutes appear to be attempts at rediscovery of known processes /products.

In the light of this background, it would appear that the working out of know-how for established processes and products need not necessarily be as costly as developing a hitherto unknown process or product.

There have been varying views expressed by experts in regard to these matters. The C.S.I.R. has been taking a pragmative view and decides upon individual cases on merits. Pilot Plant proposals as recommended by Executive Councils have been provided with funds and no worthwhile project has suffered for want of funds.
