- (i) Dockyard Labour Union, representing the Industrial employees.
- (ii) Mazagaon Dock Clerical Staff Union
- (b) and (c) No formal request has been received from the Technical Staff Association of Officers for recognition.

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF FOREIGN TRADE (CHOWDHARY RAM SEWAK): (a) and (b) Government of India have very recently decided to form a wholly owned subsidiary of the State Trading Corporation of India with its Registered Office in Delhi and Principal office in Cochin for the import of raw cashewnuts. Its details are being worked out.

PROMOTIONAL PROSPECTS IN SUBSIDIARY CADRES OF THE EXTERNAL AFFAIRS MINISTRY

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI SURENDRA PAL SINGH): (a) Yes, Sir.

(b) In pursuance of the recommendations of the Committee on the Indian Foreign Service (the "Pillai Committee"), 14 officers of the Information Service of India have been promoted to the Indian Foreign Service. Representations received from subsidiary cadres for improving promotional prospects, are under conside-deration.
