Import requirements of the units in the smal scale sector will be met on the basis of hese assessments having regard to the availability of foreign exchange resources.

- (b) whether it is a fact that Pakistan is again trying to start hostile activities against India; and

(c) if so, whether the countries as mentioned above have also given defence supplies to India and if so, to what extent?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI SURENDRA PAL SINGH) :(a) India's well known views regarding arms supplies to Pakistan are constantly brought to the notice of foreign Governments through diplomatic channels. They have been made fully aware that any further arms build up by Pakistan poses a threat to the security of India, creates tension the sub-continent. and retards the chances of normalisation ofbetween the two countries. We hope the concered Governments will take our consideration before taking views into any decision to supply arms to Pakistan.

- (b) The House has been kept informed from time to time of Pakistan's policy of hostility towards India and the threat posed by her individually and in collusion with China. There has been no significant change in this position.
- (c) It is not in the public interest to disclose this information.
