A Delegation of His Majesty's Government of Nepal, led by the Foreign Secretary, Shri Yadu Nath Khanal, held discussions with a delegation of the Government of India, headed by Foreign Secretaiy, Shri T. M. Kaul, from the 2gih August till the 4th September, 1 g6g. The Foreign Secretary of Nepal was assisted by :

The two delegations expressed their satisfaction at the conclusion of the Secretary, Ministry of Home Affairs, talks and the freindly atmosphere in which they were conducted. The Nepalese delegation thanked the Indian side for their warm hospitality, understanding and close cooperation.
