- (c) the reasons why security arrangements and na ral and land patrolling of the vital Kitch-Saurashtra coast are not completely successful;
- (d) the number of arreests for violation of our Coastal rights along the Kutch Sindh Naval border and the number of convictions and sentences of imprison-
- (e) the year when the working of our security arrangements in the above region by land, air and sea has been reviewed; and
- (f) whether facts have come to the notice of Government that some Indian nationals on our side of the border have been cooperating in spionage and smuggling?

THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE STEEL AND HEAVY ENGINEERING (SARDAR SWARAN SINGH) : (a) Government have not seen this particular news items. However, according to in-formation available, the local police apprehended hree Pak fishing boats in Savlapir area on 28-29th September 1969.

- (b) There have been other instances of apprehension of Pakistani boats and crew in our territorial waters.
- (c) and (e) Naval and Police arrangements exist for patrolling in our coastal waters and along the land border with Pakistan, and these are kept under constant review. The effectiveness of the arrangements is apparent from the fact of appre-hension of intruders in our territorial waters.
- (d) and (f. Information is being collected and will be laid on the Table of the House in due ourse.

IMPORT OF INDUSTRIAL RAW MATERIALS THROUGH STATE SECTOR

271. SHRI A. G. KULKARNI: SHRI BALACHANDRA MENON SHRI CHITTA BASU:

Will the Minister of FOREIGN TRADE be pleased to refer to the reply to Starred Question No. 138 given in the Rajya Sabha on the 21st August, 1969 and state what further steps have since been taken by Government to canalise completely the imports of industrial raw materials through the S ate Sector?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF FOREIGN TRADE (CHOWDHARY RAM SEWAK): While no new item has been canalised since August, 1969, the import of 18 items and the export of 13 items have been canalised through S. T. C. & M. M. T. C. during the current financial year. Canalisation of Imports and Exports is a continuing process and a decision to canalise is taken from time to time if circumstances so warrant and the needs of public interests are fulfilled.

- (a) whether a meeting of the representatives of India and Nepal was held in New Delhi in September last, and if so, what was the nature of discussion held; and
- (b) whether any accord was reached on the outstanding matters between the two countries and if so, what are the contents of those accords?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI SURENDRAPAL SINGH): (a) Yes, Sir. A meeting of the representatives of India and Nepal was held in New Delhi

from August 29 to September 4, 1969. The discussions between the two delegations covered a wide range of subjects of common interest to both countries in the fields of economic relations, trade and transit, irrigation and power, location of boundary and defence and security.

(b) A copy of the Joint statement issued at the end of the talks held in New Delhi is placed on the Table of the House.

Joint Statement issued at the End of the Indo Nepal Talks held in New Delhi From August 29 to September 4, 1969.

A Delegation of His Majesty's Government of Nepal, led by the Foreign Secretary, Shri Yadu Nath Khanal, held discussions with a delegation of the Government of India, headed by Foreign Secretary, Shri T. M. Kaul, from the 29th August till the 4th September, 1969. The Foreign Secretary of Nepal was assisted by:

The two delegations held detailed discussions in an atmosphere of complete understanding, mutual trust and friendship. The discussions covered a wide range of subjects of common interest to both

countries in the fields of economic relations, trade and transit, irrigation and power, location of boundary, defence and security. Joint and several recommendations were made by both delegations on all these subjects to their respective governments for consideration and approval. It was noted that some speculative press reports had appeared which were unauthorised and incorrect.

The two delegations agreed on the identity of interests between the two governments and peoples in various fields based on mutual respect for each other's territorial integrity and sovereignty and mututal understanding, trust and confidence. They agreed that the very close and extensive cooperation between the two governments was of benefit to both countries and that it should be further strengthened in their common interest. The close historical, geographical, cultural, economic and political relations existing between India and Nepal through the ages have been further strengthened in recent years and both delegations expressed their confidence that these would be still further strengthened in the years to come. It was agreed that meetings at various levels should be held periodically between the two sides to resolve any difficulties that may arise between the two countries in the implementation of their policies and programmes. The two delegations expressed their satisfaction at the conclusion of the talks and the freindly atmosphere in which they were conducted. The Nepalese delegation thanked the Indian side for their warm hospitality, understanding and close cooperation.
